

Directing credits include plays by Samuel Beckett, Harold Pinter, Israel Horowitz, and the world premiere of "The Other Extreme" by Ignasi Garcia at the Sitges International Festival of Theatre. He is Director of Business Development at American Public Television, a member of The Dramatists Guild of America and of SGAE (Guild of Authors & Editors, Spain).

Director's Note:

Welcome to the COF Theater Project's performance of *The Tragedy of Romeo & Juliet.* We hope you enjoy this classic tale of star-crossed lovers that has stood the test of time to remain one of the Bard's most popular plays. There is an abundance of scholarly work on Shakespeare and his plays. The story of *Romeo & Juliet* appeared in various earlier poems, stories and other forms, from which Shakespeare drew his inspiration. There actually were two real young lovers named Romeo & Juliet who lived in Verona, Italy and who died for each other in or about the year 1303.

Shakespeare's *Romeo & Juliet* is thought to have first been performed between 1593 and 1594. The play has remained extremely popular throughout the centuries. In the seventeenth century, some producers took great literary license with Shakespeare's original work. In some productions, *Romeo and Juliet* actually survive their ordeal to live happily ever after! The tragic story of these two young lovers has continued to inspire countless adaptions in many formats. There have been more than eighteen film versions of the play, numerous film adaptions (perhaps most ignobly *Pizza My Heart*, which tells the story of a son and daughter of two rival pizzeria owners who fall in love, much to the disapproval of both families, set in Verona, New Jersey), as well as ballets, symphonies and, perhaps most famously, Leonard Bernstein's classic musical *West Side Story*.

It has been a true pleasure to travel on the journey of creating this production of *Romeo & Juliet* with this very talented cast & crew of COF students. Working on a Shakespeare play offers actors, designers and a tech crew amazing opportunities, and daunting challenges. This dedicated group of students embraced both with commitment, creativity and heart. So please sit back, relax, and we hope you enjoy the show. See you anon!
